Paros's Timeless Simplicity




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The building itself uses rational geometry including a cube-like structure, concrete columns, thick masonry, and arches.

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Natural materials merge with a soothing color palette and an eclectic collection of vintage and modern furniture, from Greek design pieces to ceramics sourced in North Africa. Parilio hotel is on the Greek Island of Paros, where people move to the slow rhythm of Cycladic life. Owners Kalia and Antonis Eliopoulos employed Athens-based Interior Design Laboratorium for the fourth time to create a hotel. Structurally, the 33-suite hotel looks like a cubist form that is defined by its geometry, arches, concrete columns, and thick masonry—the architects were influenced by the island's own distinctive architecture and serenity. The hotel has a neutral color palette of whites that are complemented by the deep Mediterranean earth tones featured on woven fabrics including the bedspreads. The furniture is a mix of vintage and modern pieces, both by contemporary Greek and European designers, alongside ceramics from North Africa. The vast swimming pool looks onto the wild beauty of Paros's pastoral landscape, and the idyll is just minutes from the beautiful Kolimpithres Beach.
